Nevertheless, many Western scholars argue that in its earliest stage Sikhism was a movement within the Hindu tradition; Nanak, they point out, was raised a Hindu and eventually belonged to the Sant tradition of northern India , a movement associated with the great poet and mystic Kabir (1440-1518).

Sikh music or Shabad kirtan is Kirtan-style singing of hymns or Shabad from the Guru Granth Sahib, the central text of Sikhism.. 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The answer is that a direct equivalent to the above hypothetical scenario actually exists as an ongoing dispute raging within Sikhism over the divine origin of a compositional prayer of twelve verses, running into sixty lines, called the Ragmala.
